

Communicating With Parents of Children Involved in a Cyberbullying Incident

Here are some top tips for teachers when communicating with parents of children involved in a cyberbullying incident.

- Have all the **information and facts** regarding the bullying situation **to hand** when speaking with parents.
- Listen to parent's concerns and show understanding of their feelings.
- Explain, as necessary, the definition of cyberbullying so parents can understand why the incident constitutes cyberbullying and understand the impact on the person who experiences it along with why someone might engage in cyberbullying behaviour.
- Inform parents of the school's Anti-Bullying and Acceptable Use Policies and Procedures for dealing with cyberbullying including the steps that have been taken so far, the consequences for cyberbullying, and plans to monitor the situation.
- Encourage parents to talk to their children about respectful online communication, their digital footprint, developing empathy and appreciating differences.
- Advise parents to avoid threatening to take away access to devices or the internet as a way to resolve the issue but rather engage in a non-judgemental conversation with their child about their habits online and model safe and respectful on and offline behaviours.
- **Discuss supports available to their child,** as needed, e.g. counselling, extracurricular activities to boost self-esteem, additional learning supports.
- **Direct parents to supports available for them** e.g. National Parents Council, Webwise Parent's Hub (webwise.ie/parents).
